Tribute band offers Kiss of different eras

Want to "rock 'n' roll all night and party every day" with Kiss?

Well, the legendary rockers won't make it Friday night, but you'll swear it's the real group when you see the Kiss Nation tribute band on stage at the Whistle Stop Festival and BBQ Cook-off.

"Kiss is the quintessential rock band," Carlos Espada, who plays Simmons' Kiss character, said by phone. "They were four guys like the Beatles who took it a step further with the makeup and the big show.

There may be guys who sing better in other bands, but these guys sing, play, dance and musi-cally have it all. They've been selling albums for almost 30 years,"

Based out of New York City, the same city that brought the world the real Kiss, Kiss Nation has been on the tribute scene for nearly a decade with near-identical costumes, makeup and sound. The band has worked with the Kiss camp on many projects, including Kiss toy lines and promotions, the Kiss box set, Simmons' autobiography and Tongue magazine. The guys

have also worked closely with Silvertone guitars in promoting its Paul Stanley guitar line.
VH1 filmed a documentary

on the band entitled "Mock Rock" in which the VH1 cameras followed the band in and out of the Kiss world, leading up to the band playing a show for Gene Simmons, Paul Stanley, Tommy Thaver and Doc McGhee.

"I've worked with Gene Simmons on many occasions," Espada said. "We've helped with the Kiss dolls, other Kiss products, helped Gene promote his book and their box set. We're on good terms with the band.

"VH1 shot the documentary two years ago and we were the only Kiss tribute band they used. It was neat to have the real band come to our show.'

Espada started the Kiss tribute band in late 1996. But the inspiration for the group came

decades earlier.

"When I was 4 years old I was watching television and a commercial came on for a Kiss album," Espada said. "They were drooling and spitting blood and fire and I thought they were liveaction superheroes. On my fifth birthday, my brother bought me 'Kiss Alive' and it changed my life around."

Espada is joined in the band by Benny Doro as the Starchild, Gerard as the Fox and Cat and Ruby as Space Ace. Espada says Kiss Nation is much different from the other 100-odd Kiss tribute bands around the coun-"We do a no-

holds barred show of hits from the '70s, '80s and '90s and also use the Fox character," said Espada. Peter Criss, the Cat character, left Kiss in 1980 and was replaced by Eric Carr as the Fox.

"We're basically the poor man's Kiss show. Some people can't afford to go to a real Kiss show, so we give them a Kiss show and do everything that goes on.

Let's face it, though their legacy lives on eternally etched in the anals—excuse me—annals of rock history, the real living, (fire)breath-ing KISS are trying very hard to rain on their loyal legion's parade. Because of a strange twist of irony, I think it's time for the Army to revolt (and judging by recent ticket sales, it already seems many of their soldiers have gone AWOL).

In this case the irony rests in that it's the original band showing all the greed and lack of artistry cover bands are slammed for, and it's KISSNATION in this case, that is doing it for fun and-get thiswith a twist of originality (they're the only KISS tribute boasting the Eric Carr Creatures Of The Night show).

Say for example, like, you can't afford to fork over the \$129.95 to go see the real KISS's 34th (and this time it's Fi-Fi-Fi-fi-naaaauuuuill) Farewell Tour, you can go see the next closest thing, KISSNA-TION, for just a fraction of the price. Let's face it, the real KISS isn't even real anymore. Ace Frehley is not really alive and moving. It's just sophisticated lighting and pyro that makes him appear alive. Other-wise, it's Weekend At Ace's, boys!

So save yourself the expensive risk of totally harboring nothing but shame and pity for what the ravages of age have stricken upon on the once ravenous beasts of rock. It's more convincing seeing young guys playing young KISS, than the old guys playing young KISS (and there's a hell of lot more money left to get loaded in the process). Like for instance, take this Saturday's (Oct. 14) Aquarian night at The Stanley Cup in Linden. It's a trip back to the '70s with KISSNATION, Sack Blabbath and Romeo's Delight (VH covers); while downstairs at Tremors it's a Studio 54 dance party with prizes and giveaways-and it won't cost a c-note to enter

I spoke with KISSNATION's Ace recently as he awaited his inevitable rivite to replace his speculatively deceased counterpart

How do you respond to the criticism that cover/tribute bands ire a scourge on existing original music scenes?

We've never really faced a bad sense of criticism. It's just kind of hard being a tribute band. We're not doing this for the sake of getting signed, to get famous. We do this basically for fun to tribute the band we love the most. And a lot of that costs a pretty penny sometimes. Would you agree that there are more KISS tribute bands than

That's the charisma KISS have. There's something about them that just clicks with people. We've been doing this for a while, and you'd have to be blind not to see all these other bands doing exactly the

is that why you went on to re-create the Creatures Of The Nightera KISS?

Exactly. It started as a goof. Our drummer, who is much more of a fan of Eric Carr, came out in full Eric Carr regalia, so we started playing songs from that era and people just flipped. From then on we've been doing shows from Creatures Of The Night-era KISS. So we've seen re-creating the stage set from that tour. The drum riser is a miniature tank that shoots pyro out of the cannon-y'know, it's silly like that, but people go nuts for it because people just never see it

In New York alone I can count three KISS bands, and they all do the same show. We just went to the Trenton KISS show yesterday. We were hired to do an appearance at a pre-show party across the street from the arena. And people just flipped simply because of what we do. Everyone said the same thing: 'nobody does this! Nobody does Eric Carr; why not?" We could go out and do a Peter Criss show, but why bother? Everyone else does it.

From what places do you guys garner the best response?

Clubs that cater to us are outside of New York. New Jersey and Long Island area. Bigger stages, better promotion than New York. We get a better response right from the get-go. In New York we get the esitant, 'aaah, we've never dealt with that before...I don't know...We only do the original acts...

Do people respond to you like you really are Ace and ask you shit as if you were him? How welrd is that?

(laughs) Being called by the characters' names happens all the time, only because people just don't know our real names, yeah; but there have been times, perhaps due to the alcohol level of the crowd, people get into the whole worship thing sometimes. The amount of e-mail, it's just-we get-we get really weird mail. And people will comment, You look just like Ace. And I'll respond jokingly, I don't know how to take that, he's the ugliest guy in the group!" Or they'll say, 'You play just like Ace!' Well, I don't know how to take that either because he's a really sloppy guitar player.

Do you ever watch the real KISS and wonder, 'y'know what, if I was up there...'I can do Ace better than Ace is doing Ace.

Not only me, but any other Ace tribute KISS guy could basically blow Ace away right now. We were at the show last night sitting right up front and we were just cringing at every mistake they made. It was like, 'Oh my God!'

What does it take to be the best tribute band out there?

Everyone can say-and I've heard it before-we've been guilty of it ourselves, saying 'the best KISS tribute band ever!' That's all fine and good. There are a lot of bands that are great. But they're all basically playing the same thing; the same era. We take pride in knowing that it may be debatable that we're the best, but we know that we are the most different, and we know we stand out the most.

One last question: Has any of KISS's notorious female fan base rubbed off on you guys after shows?

I've got to be honest with you, I guess it is just like the real KISS. The most attention from the females is definitely directed to the Gene and Paul guys. Ace and Eric...I'm famous for getting the drunk guys mumbling, "You fuckin" rule Ace! You rock!" Just because I don't have a long tongue, I can't play Gene. It's very funny though; I've had female friends tell me they have major crushes on the bass player, and I'm like you know what that guy looks like without make-up?

Kiss: One of the most the atrical rock bands of all time, as well as great songwriters. Tons of devoted Kiss fans seek tribute bands to experience as close to the real deal as possible. Kiss Nation are a killer Kiss tribute act that will make you "love it loud!" I recently caught them at the Wreck Room in Wallington, NJ.

The stage show is just as important as the music when it comes to Kiss Nation, and these guys fore it up. They began the show with a huge pyrotechnic blast from two flashpots. Each member was wearing the platform shoes, costume, and proper face make-up of their respective Kiss character.

One of the most popular Kiss members is Gene Simmons. Carlos does an excellent impression of the Demon. During the performance he breathed fire, spit up blood, and shot flames from his bass. He sung Gene-style vocals and he even pulled out the "axe bass" for "God Of Thunder." He played accurately, as heard in the moving bass lines in songs like "Love Gun," and "Detroit Rock City."

The congeniality and skills of Paulie make him an excellent Paul Stanley impersonator. He teased the crowd a bit by throwing on a fire helmet and asking the crowd what song they wanted to hear. Instead of playing "Firehouse" they went into "Heaven's On Fire." Paulie sounded just like Paul, both vocally and musically, and he kept the crowd alive with his antics. He and the band did the famous extended version of "Rock-

N-Roll All Nite," making the crowd repeat the chorus.

Appearing as the Space Ace was Ruby. He, Carlos and Paul synchronized a lot of cool moves on rockin' tunes like "Deuce." All through the show, Ruby jammed out some burning Ace Frehley leads on his Les Paul. It was literally smoking (with pyrotechnic assistance) when he went into his solo after he sung lead vocals on "Rip It Out."

Representing the late great Fox (Eric Carr) was Joey. At some shows he appears as the Cat (Peter Chris). Joey has mastered that solid grooving Kiss drumming, as evidenced in songs like "Dr. Love" and "Rocket Ride." He even sang "Beth," and handed roses to a few girls.

A highlight for the explosive show was when they had about six girls come onto the stage and dance for the tune "Take It Off."


